

Literacy Timeline





➤ Encourage expecting families to develop daily literacy habits

➤ Educate expecting parents about early literacy skills and how children learn those skills

➤ Enable expecting parents to be more confident as their child's first teacher

Womb Literacy Will Not

> Enable babies to read and write in the womb

Enable babies to be born knowing how to read and write

Statistics

- Fewer than half of parents (48%) in the United States read to their younger children daily
- > 35% of children entering kindergarten today lack the basic language skills needed to learn to read
- Children who read on grade level by the end of third grade are more successful in school, work, and in life

Statistics

➤ 66% of 4th graders were not proficient in reading (2013 national average)


> 83% of African American 4th graders were not proficient in reading (2013)

> 54% of Children were not attending preschool (2011-13 national average)

Iowa 3rd Grade Retention Law

➤ 3rd grade students below grade level in reading may have to repeat that grade

Transition from "learning to read" to "reading to learn"



- Geared toward expecting parents
- Learn about early literacy skills and how children learn them
- Build confidence in parent role as child's first teacher



Storytime Formats

Baby Storytime:

- > Theme: seasonal
- Welcome: sing song
- Library component: Read books/rhymes
- Free play: play with toys and other children

Stork Storytime:

- > Theme: early literacy skill
- ➤ Welcome: explain concept
- ➤ Library component: Guest speaker with library tie in
- Social time: form networks of support

Six Early Literacy Skills

- ➤ Print Motivation I love books
- ➤ Enriched Vocabulary I know words
- ➤ Print Awareness I see words
- ➤ Phonological Awareness I hear words
- ➤ Letter Knowledge I know my ABCs
- ➤ Narrative Skills I tell stories


Print Motivation

Fun with Puppets

Have fun with simple puppets!

Help your child color in the bear. Cut out and paste onto a popsicle stick or craft stick.

Your child can use this simple puppet to re-tell a favorite story or make up one of his/her own.



Action Rhyme

Make up actions to go with the words

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, shut the door.

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, count to four.

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, reach up high.

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, wink one eye.

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, put away your shoes.

Teddy Bear, Teddy Bear, say, "Goodnight."

TRY THIS AT HOME:

- Let your child choose the book he/she wants to read.
- Stop reading if your child loses interest. A few short reading times that are enjoyable are better than a long experience.
- Create a comfortable environment in which to share books with your child.
- Put books within easy reach so your child can choose them on his/her own.



Read to the Bump

➤ OBGYN doctors distribute books & early literacy information to expecting moms at their 6-9 month prenatal appointments

Encourage expecting families to develop a reading routine before baby is born

> Builds baby's personal library before birth

Read to the Bump

- > Family developing daily reading routines
- ➤ Encouraging a love of reading from the very beginning
- > Siblings able to practice their literacy skills
- > Health benefits to both mother and baby


