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# **Kentucky State Archives and the Pandemic**

The COVID-19 pandemic has certainly caused many changes in Kentucky and the Archives and Records Management (ARM) Division staff has adapted to meet the challenges to ensure continued customer service to all citizens and state and local agencies.

The Archives Research Room closed to the public on March 18, 2020 and reopened, on a limited basis, June 14, 2021. While closed, Research Room staff worked on a rotational basis within the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA) building. A majority of the staff were telecommuting, either detailed to assist with Unemployment Insurance (UI), Education and Workforce and Development Cabinet, or with AXAEM data entry, the ARM Division's content management system. The rotational staff answered legal and genealogical requests. As expected, the number of requests coming in, during this time, increased since customers were not able to come on-site to do research.

The Archival Services Branch had several staff changes over the last year or so. Walter Bowman, the former Research Room supervisor, returned to the Department of Military Affairs, and four employees left during the closure period, including the retirement of Lisa Thompson, the Special Format Librarian/Archivist. Currently, we are nearly fully staffed and are just waiting for Lisa's former position to be filled after some changes to the position description as we work to bring back Arrangement and Description to the Archival Services Branch.

The State Records Center suspended records pick up services though was able to continue accepting deliveries. Received records were quarantined per REALM (REopening Archives, Libraries, and Museums) project recommendations. Records pick up services resumed May 2021. Other State Records Branch services, such as retention scheduling, assistance with records management, and records destruction continued; meetings were conducted virtually. Meetings continue to be conducted virtually, but staff have started to meet in-person, as well.

For the Local Records Branch, services were largely uninterrupted during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Regional Administrators (RAs) are field workers, so not being in the office or having access to records was not an issue. Staff created remote processes and these were very much dependent upon assistance from the local agencies, and vendor cooperation. Previously, we would go into the local office, appraise/identify records for preservation, create title targets for security microfilming, etc. Now, staff work cooperatively, requesting confirmation of archived records for further preservation activities or obtaining video/photos of records storage to advise on space and shelving options.

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## **Kentucky Archives Month to be Observed in October**



# **Kentucky State Archives and the Pandemic**

Virtual records management training was a hit and the most requested service since the pandemic began. Destruction guidance is a close second, and retention updates an even closer third. The Local Records Branch created guidance documents and targeted records management training and placed them on the applicable KDLA webpages. Overall, the Branch has provided more services to local offices and access to resources than in pre-pandemic times. We are excited about that and daily, we look for ways to improve service delivery.

The Electronic Records Branch has been able to continue most of its functions and services during the pandemic. All staff who could worked remotely, with those with on-premises job tasks rotating for two days in the building a week. As vaccines became available, Electronic Records Branch staff returned to the building for three days a week (and telecommuting the other two), in a schedule designed to keep numbers onsite low.

# Kentucky State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAB)

SHRAB is a body established in each state and territory to provide guidance and oversight for historical records coordination within that state or territory. The primary responsibility of a SHRAB member is to review grant applications to the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC). The broader responsibility is to work with the Board and the State Coordinator to foster historical records programs throughout the state. In addition, individual states have established specific roles for their SHRABs in the historical records community.

The SHRAB Board is composed of members who have experience or interest in the collection, administration, and use of historical records and are dedicated to the preservation and use of Kentucky's documentary heritage. The SHRAB is part of the State Archives and Records Commission, with members appointed by the State Librarian and staff support provided by the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives. As specified in 36 CFR Part 1206, a majority of the members must have recognized experience in the administration of government records, historical records, or archives. The State Archivist serves as Coordinator of the Board. The State Historical Records Advisory Board is coordinated by the Archives and Records Management Division, Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives.

# Caleb Powers Case Documents Digitized and Available Online

The staff of the Kentucky State Archives would like to express our gratitude to Friends' member Glen McAninch for his kind and very generous financial support. This assistance enabled the Archives to scan, digitize, and make available online a special collection of Scott County Circuit Court Criminal Case Files.

This set of records, "Commonwealth of Kentucky vs. Caleb Powers" (1898-1903 and 1907-1908), includes four cases, and is one of the most interesting collections in the State Archives.

These materials were scanned as high-resolution TIFF files, converted, and combined into PDF's. Digital Projects Archivist Heath Reynolds meticulously indexed each page, recording the names of individuals involved, important locations mentioned, and then assigned appropriate subject headings. This data was then embedded in the PDF's, and is fully searchable in the Kentucky State Digital Archives (KSDA) through Preservica.
