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KDLA Staff Attend SARC

Four staff members of the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA), Archives and Records Management (ARM) Division attended the Southeastern Archives and Conference (SARC) held in Morrow, Georgia on October 27-29. The conference featured session archival administration. tracks on records management initiatives, electronic records and oversight of digital repositories, state and local government records, processing and management archival collections. conservation preservation, online collections and reference services, and restricted records.

SARC is an opportunity to meet with other state archives colleagues from the Southeastern region to exchange ideas, experiences, and expertise. All sessions were educational and provided staff in attendance with new concepts and techniques that will assist KDLA in future training efforts.

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Twenty-Five Local Government Agencies Receive Grants to Preserve Local Records

The Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA) within the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet has awarded 25 recipients more than \$575,000 of the Local Records Grant Program funds to preserve and manage local government records.

The Local Records Program helps to preserve, protect, and make available records with continuing archival value and assists local agencies with records management through direct services, training, and grant support.

"The Commonwealth of Kentucky has a rich past and hope for a vibrant future. This Local Records Program ensures our Kentucky history is passed on to our children and grandchildren," said Governor Andy Beshear.

KDLA has awarded 25 grants statewide totaling \$574,695 of fiscal year 2020 Local Records Grant Program funds. Funds are made available through fees enacted by the Kentucky General Assembly to preserve and retain local public records. Any local government agency may apply for this grant.

"There is a continual need to preserve and provide access to the public documents that record the history of our Commonwealth," KDLA Commissioner Terry Manuel said. "This program allows local officials to maintain records that otherwise might be lost, benefiting current and future generations of Kentuckians."

The second round of 2020 Local Records Grant Program funds have been awarded to the following recipients: Allen County Clerk, Boyle County Clerk, Bracken County Clerk, Butler County Fiscal Court, Carroll County Clerk, Christian County Clerk, Covington City Clerk, Fayette County Clerk, Grant County Clerk, Graves County Clerk, Hancock County Clerk, City of Hickory Hill, Hopkins County Clerk, Hopkins County Fiscal Court, Jefferson County Clerk, Knott County Clerk, Lyon County Clerk, Oldham County Water District, Perry County Clerk, Rolling Hills City Clerk, Ryland Heights City Clerk, Taylor County Clerk, Todd County Clerk, Trigg County Clerk, and Webster County Clerk.

With four regional administrators working with local officials, KDLA ensures professional archival and records management assistance in county and city offices, school districts, and health departments. Local Records Grant Program funds have supported work in microfilming, preservation, equipment, automated indexing, digital imaging systems, and codification of ordinances.

KDLA provides equitable access to quality library and information resources and services, as well as helps public agencies ensure that legislatively mandated documentation of government programs is created, efficiently maintained, and made accessible.


Archives and Records Management (ARM) Division Welcomes New Staff

NHPRC Grant Update



The Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA) received a two-year Access to Historical Records: Archival Projects grant to facilitate access to early legal records through the digitization, preservation, and online dissemination of existing volumes, loose papers, and microfilm of Kentucky General Court and Kentucky naturalization records. Though the COVID-19 situation has affected our work on this grant, we are excited to report that over 1,900 pages of the General Court records have been digitized to date. The naturalization records will be digitized soon. Temporary staff are being trained to prepare the raw files into PDF's that will then have descriptive metadata added either in house or by the public through a crowdsourcing project. KDLA is currently evaluating crowdsourcing applications.

30th Public Archives Symposium

The Friends of Kentucky Public Archives, Inc. and the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives sponsored another successful Public Archives Symposium on November 7, 2019 at the Paul Sawyier Public Library in Frankfort.

David Kirkpatrick, Genealogy and Reference Librarian at the Mercer County Public Library, discussed his new book, **The War of 1812 in the West: From Fort Detroit to New Orleans**. Kirkpatrick provided a very informative overview of the war and spoke about the research that was performed while writing his book.

The Symposium, a yearly event, increases the public's awareness of the wide range of historical records available for research in Kentucky's repositories and provides information for scholars, researchers, and genealogists in archival research.
