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Rusty Heckaman Appointed State Archivist

The Executive Leadership Team would like to announce that Rusty Heckaman has been appointed State Archivist for the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives. The State Archivist is the Division Director for the Archives and Records Management Division. As the State Archivist, he will oversee the Archives and Records Management Division, which is comprised of the Archival Services Branch, Electronic Records Branch, Local Records Branch, and State Records Branch. The Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA) look forward to having him in this role.

Prior to coming to KDLA, Rusty was an instructor librarian at Austin Community College, and an Archivist at the Austin History Center, American Academy of Pediatrics, and Abbot Laboratories. He has been the Research Room Supervisor since 2021 where he has worked to make the resources more accessible to researchers, genealogists, and patrons. Rusty has also championed our collaboration with FamilySearch. Rusty has a bachelor's degree in history from Indiana University South Bend and a master's degree in library science from Indiana University Purdue University of Indianapolis. He is actively involved in the Professional Archival Community including the Kentucky Council on Archives and the Society of American Archivists.

Maegan Mohr joined KDLA as an intern this summer from Eastern Kentucky University's history program. Here is her report on her time with us:

My experience at KDLA this summer exceeded my expectations. As a history student, it was exciting to get a chance to be around primary sources and immerse myself in historic documents every day. One of my favorite parts was getting to work with civil case documents and read snippets from the lives of people who lived over one hundred years ago. I enjoyed trying to decipher their handwriting and looking up old-fashioned legal terminology when I was stumped. On top of this, I am walking away with a better understanding of archival practices. Even learning about some of the limitations facing the industry, such as the vast number of records versus limited amount of space, will make me more understanding when I go to other archives for my own research in the future.

I was not sure what to expect when I started my internship in July, but the staff in the Archives branch was so welcoming and willing to answer any questions I had. I am grateful to Denise and Dena for passing my information on to the Archives department after my interview so that I had a chance to learn about the side of the field that I was most passionate about, and to Jennifer and Rusty for welcoming me to this tightknit group. I value the connections I have made with wonderful people during my time here and I deeply appreciate their collective commitment to ensuring that I walked away from this experience having learned as much as I could.

Former KDLA Commissioner Passed Away in September

Jim Nelson was the Kentucky state librarian and commissioner of the Department for Libraries and Archives for 26 years. He was a true gentleman who was dedicated to Kentucky libraries. He was always looking for new ways to provide library services to all Kentuckians and was well respected in the field across the country.

Jim was kind and consistently helpful to all. He provided guidance to many young library directors over the years and encouraged library growth and expansion, especially in underserved areas of the Commonwealth.

Jim also had a fondness for KY history and never forgot about the important role the state archives play in the preservation of our past. He remained connected to libraries through KLA and to the State Archives through the Friends of the Kentucky Public Archives.

Jim was chair of the Kentucky Information Systems Commission (later Kentucky Information Resources Management Commission) soon after its creation by the legislature, laying the groundwork for decades of cooperation between the archives and the information technology agency.

Jim had a special interest in advocacy and encouraged libraries of all types to work with their leaders on the local, county and state levels. In many ways, he nurtured the seeds of library advocacy in Kentucky and is responsible for encouraging all libraries to promote their services. It wasn't unusual to get a news clipping in the mail or a note from Jim congratulating you and your library on an accomplishment. Jim was a thoughtful, dedicated human being who took great pride in being a librarian.
