### Planning for a New State Records Center

The Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives, Public Records Division currently maintains two State Records Center locations in Frankfort, both of which are leased warehouse facilities. In an effort to increase governmental efficiency and save taxpayer dollars, a project is underway to consolidate these two Records Center facilities.

While the State Archives Center stores permanently valuable records of historical importance, the State Records Centers provide a cost-effective service to agencies for the storage and management of their non-permanent records. The State Records Centers hold a combined 195,000 cubic feet of mostly short-term state agency records, which can be destroyed when the scheduled retention period has been met.

The Public Records Division is working with the Finance and Administration Cabinet to secure a new facility so that all these materials can be stored at one location, under optimal conditions. The building will be either a new structure or a remodeled existing facility, depending on the outcome of the bidding process. Staff members have reviewed plans and toured potential sites. Contractors have submitted one round of plans and the request for final

proposals was sent. Finance Cabinet staff is working to address questions and concerns the potential contractors have had in putting together their final bids. PRD staff are busy planning for the move, making arrangements and estimating costs. Moving all the boxes, shelving and equipment will be a huge and time-consuming undertaking.

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#### **Archives Month 2009**

Kentucky Archives Month is planned for October 2009, in conjunction with American Archives Month. This year the Commonwealth of Kentucky will commemorate the 200th anniversary of the birth of the sixteenth President of the United States, Abraham Lincoln. President Lincoln was born on February 12, 1809 in Hardin County (present day LaRue County), Kentucky. Records of Lincoln, his family, and the Mary Todd Lincoln family are preserved and made available in archives, numerous special collections, libraries, and other repositories across the state.

The Kentucky State Capitol Building in Frankfort is located in the southern section of the city, and overlooks the Kentucky River. The Capitol is a very impressive example of the French Renaissance style of architecture, and has served as the seat of Kentucky government since 1910. The State Archives holds a collection of records of the State Capitol Building Commission, the agency charged with the oversight of construction of the edifice. This collection, though not large, contains a great deal of extremely valuable information and would be helpful to anyone with an interest in the history of this grand structure.


**Capitol Building Commission** 

The previous Capitol Building had been erected in 1830, and by the beginning of the twentieth century was obviously no longer adequate. The legislature used money from a recent debt settlement with the federal government to fund the new building. Formed in 1904, the State Capitol Building Commission was chaired by Governor J.C.W. Beckham, with the Secretary of State, Auditor, State Treasurer and Attorney General also serving as members. The Commission selected Frank Andrews as the building architect, and construction began in 1905. The new Capitol was completed in five years, at a total cost of \$1,750,000.

records of the State The Capitol Building Commission include a Minute Book (1904-1911), which documents the meetings and discussions held by the group and describes the planning and construction process; a Receipts and Estimates Book (1904-1909) containing original vouchers and receipts for construction materials; and a Ledger Book (1904-1914), which lists financial entries made over the course of the project. The Ledger Book also contains a few entries relating to the construction of the Governor's Mansion, which was built in the years immediately following the completion of the Capitol.

Kentuckians are justifiably proud of their beautiful Capitol, and as we near the centennial of the dedication of the building in 2010, researchers are invited to make use of the records of the State Capitol Building Commission to learn more about its history.



"This documentary legacy is a rich resource for all Kentuckians that enhances our understanding of our shared historical experience and is of lasting benefit to this and future generations," said Wayne Onkst, State Librarian and Commissioner of the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives.

Almost 300 archival and manuscript repositories in Kentucky hold archival records that document the history of Kentucky. Their holdings include personal papers, photographs, Bibles, diaries, letters, and government records, such as marriage certificates and wills. #### **New State Records Center**

The move into one building will allow increased efficiency and cost savings. Under the current arrangement, PRD pays rent for two buildings, and the Records Center staff must travel between them to shelve boxes, refile materials and pull records to fill requests. This requires using extra staff time, putting extra wear on vehicles, and consuming more gas. Maintaining one facility will mean paying only one lease and saving employees' time and vehicle expenses. Customers who want to inspect records will save time and effort because they can be sure that the record they need will be on-site rather than at another location. The move will also give State Records Center staff an opportunity to inventory and audit the holdings.

The consolidation of the State Records Center facilities will result in increased productivity not only for PRD and State Records Center staff, but also for all agencies and the public. Overall, the new building will provide a much better environment for records storage and allow for more efficient retrieval. While not all the details have been determined, progress continues on planning and preparations for a new consolidated State Records Center during the next fiscal year.




