## Thinking ahead to 2022:

This is a little early, but I want to go ahead and let you know about a few events coming up in 2022. I plan to include ideas related 2022 programming in the next few editions. If you know of any state or local events that are relevant to share with this group, please email me or respond to this message.

The United Nations has declared 2022 as the International Year of Artisanal Fisheries and Aquaculture.

- Ask Fish and Wildlife representatives to conduct a program about the fisheries and aquaculture sites in the area.
- Invite a representative to talk about the employment possibilities available within this industry.

The <u>United Nations</u> has declared 2022 as the <u>International Year of Glass</u>. You can get press releases at <u>this site</u>.

- Do you have local artists who work with glass? Invite them to present a program on the art of glass. Work with your local history or tourism group to have a tour or discussion about stained glass in local churches or other local architectural structures. What about local museums? Can you partner with them to do a joint program or event about art glass? See if there are any stained glass artists in the area (work with the art department at local universities and high schools to help identify) and host a program on making stained glass. You may also want to have a program for patrons who have questions about home repairs related to stained glass windows?
- What about collectible glassware? Do you have a local antique dealer who can present a program about collectibles? Display and promote the library materials you have about art glass, collectibles, and even books about the Kentucky Derby commemorative glasses.

February 6, 2022, is the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the date that Queen Elizabeth II acceded to the throne. Find out more information here.

- Some of you all did take home kits related to tea this year. Could you pair a tea kit with information about Queen Elizabeth II?
- Display any library materials about Queen Elizabeth or other royals.

#### **Grants**

The Institute of Museum and Library Services is now accepting FY 2022 proposals for <u>National Leadership Grants for Libraries</u> (NLG-L) and the Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian program (LB21).

Applicants have through September 24, 2021, to submit their two-page preliminary proposals.

The American Library Association announced the <u>Let's Talk about It: Women's Suffrage</u> grant. **Applications will be accepted from September 1 to December 1, 2021**. Library workers can apply online at ala.org/ltai.

- Let's Talk About It (LTAI): Women's Suffrage is a reading and discussion project that will spark conversations across the United States about the women's suffrage movement.
- Led by libraries in their communities, participants will read a series of books, curated by humanities scholars, and discuss the people and events from this important part of U.S. history.
- Twenty-five libraries will be selected in 2022 to receive materials and funding to lead the first Let's Talk About It: Women's Suffrage discussions.
- LTAI: Women's Suffrage is a humanities discussion project supported by the <u>National Endowment for the Humanities</u> (NEH).

The American Library Association also announced that <u>scholarships are available</u> for those pursuing a graduate degree in library science.

### Carnegie-Whitney Grant awards up to \$5,000 for guides to library resources

The American Library Association Publishing Committee provides a grant of up to \$5,000 for the preparation of print or electronic reading lists, indexes or other guides to library resources that promote reading or the use of library resources at any type of library. Funded projects have ranged from "A Resource Guide about Disabilities, Disability Theory, and Assistive Technologies" to "A Bibliography for Queer Teens" to "Graphic Novels & the Humanity of Mental Illness" to "Web Accessibility Resources for Libraries." **Applications must be received by November 5, 2021. Recipients will be notified by February 2022.**
