November and December

- The months of November and December typically involve time with family and eating more food than usual. See
 if your local extension agent and/or a local nutritionist can do a program (or programs) on: safe food
 preparation and storage; creative ways to repurpose leftovers; shopping, cooking, and celebrating on a budget;
 portion control and healthy alternatives for classic dishes; and any other food-related programs that you can
 think about, too.
- In addition to food, the extension agent may also be able to present programs related to gift-giving on a budget and/or decorating tips on a budget.
- Invite a local veterinarian to talk about protecting pets from holiday foods and plants that can be dangerous for animals.
- Good Housekeeping magazine has <u>craft ideas</u> if you have run out and need more.

Veterans Day is November 11.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has information about the history of Veterans Day.

The Department of Defense also has information, as does the National Parks Service.

The <u>Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs</u> has resources to help with employment, homelessness, and health services.

The American Library Association put out a guide titled <u>Libraries Help and Honor Our Veterans</u> (2016). Even though it is a few years old, you may be able to glean some programming ideas from it. The article references career and legal-related programming ideas. While the pandemic has dampened in-person programming efforts, see if you can partner with your <u>local Kentucky Career Center</u> and/or veteran's organization to have a virtual or take-home event targeted to veterans. Take this opportunity to learn about the programs and services for veterans that are already available in the community, too, so that you are not duplicating efforts. These events do not have to be scheduled around Veterans Day either.

The California State Library has a programming duffel bag that lists programming ideas from easy to difficult.

The 5 Minute Librarian has information and resources, too.

Interested in starting a virtual book club for veterans? KDLA has <u>several books kits</u>, and I am glad to work with you to find titles that may appeal to the veterans (and their families) in your community.

2022 programming ideas

- 100 years ago (1922) Kentucky
 - Murray State University is founded. For more information about Murray State University check out <u>this</u> site.
 - The governor of Kentucky was Governor Edwin Morrow. Governor Morrow was born in Somerset, KY, and here he is in 1920, signing the ratification of the 19th amendment.
 - Morvich won the 48th Kentucky Derby. If you do any Derby Day programming at your library, think about highlighting what the Derby and Kentucky were like 100 years ago.
- 100 years ago (1922) national and international news of note
 - o *Ulysses* by James Joyce is published
 - -Highlight your library's materials by or about James Joyce to celebrate this anniversary.
 - -Share any *Ulysses* read-alikes with your patrons.
 - o The BBC is formed in October 1922
 - -As with the *Ulysses* anniversary, highlight any of the BBC materials (DVDs of popular series, etc.) that your library has.

- -You may want to connect this anniversary with a history of radio and news in both the United States and Great Britain.
- Howard Carter discovers King Tut's tomb and coverage about Howard Carter from Biography.com
 -Share and promote any library materials about Egypt, King Tut, archaeology, and ancient history.
 -The Kentucky Museum at Western Kentucky University is hosting an exhibit titled, <u>The Ancient Near East in KY</u>, and you may be able to talk with the museum about a virtual program in connection with the exhibit
 - -Connect with a local college or university and see if the staff can do a program about hieroglyphics, Egyptian art, Egyptian culture, etc. Faculty or staff at one of the larger public universities in Kentucky may be able to present a program virtually, too.
 - -Information about King Tut, including where his remains are now, from History.com and Britannica.com
 - -The Field Museum in Chicago has an exhibit called <u>Inside Ancient Egypt</u> that has blog posts and other ideas you may be able to incorporate into programming.
 - -The British Museum has several blog posts about Egypt that may also be useful.

The American Library Association announced the <u>Let's Talk about It: Women's Suffrage</u> grant. **Applications will be accepted from September 1 to December 1, 2021**. Library workers can apply online at <u>ala.org/ltai</u>.

- Let's Talk About It (LTAI): Women's Suffrage is a reading and discussion project that will spark conversations across the United States about the women's suffrage movement.
- Led by libraries in their communities, participants will read a series of books, curated by humanities scholars, and discuss the people and events from this important part of U.S. history.
- Twenty-five libraries will be selected in 2022 to receive materials and funding to lead the first Let's Talk About It: Women's Suffrage discussions.
- LTAI: Women's Suffrage is a humanities discussion project supported by the <u>National Endowment for the</u> Humanities (NEH).

The American Library Association also announced that <u>scholarships are available</u> for those pursuing a graduate degree in library science.

Carnegie-Whitney Grant awards up to \$5,000 for guides to library resources

The American Library Association Publishing Committee provides a grant of up to \$5,000 for the preparation of print or electronic reading lists, indexes or other guides to library resources that promote reading or the use of library resources at any type of library. Funded projects have ranged from "A Resource Guide about Disabilities, Disability Theory, and Assistive Technologies" to "A Bibliography for Queer Teens" to "Graphic Novels & the Humanity of Mental Illness" to "Web Accessibility Resources for Libraries." Applications must be received by November 5, 2021. Recipients will be notified by February 2022.
