Thanks for getting this great conversation started! I am a career changer and newly-minted librarian in a new role as Early Childhood Outreach Librarian as of two months ago. Our department has gone through a lot of recent changes and turnover, so we are entering a new phase of really rethinking and building up our outreach efforts to engage with the community and connect folx with resources.

I'm grateful to be on a well-staffed team where we now have three librarians dedicated to youth outreach, a direct result of outreach being a central focus of our library's current strategic plan. In my role, I focus on building relationships with daycares, preschools, and kindergartens in the community--largely visiting them monthly for storytime, but with opportunities to grow what that outreach looks like moving forward. I also coordinate our annual in-house Preschool and Child Care Information Night for families to come and learn about enrollment opportunities in the community for their kiddos. Then my School Outreach Coordinator colleague focuses on school-based outreach to grades 1-5, offering programs like book talks, STEM programs, author talks, book tastings, and more. And finally we have our Youth Outreach Librarian who works on partnerships in the community that are not school-based--such as with the park districts, summer camps, community events, etc. We're all relatively new in our positions, so I know for sure that we'll be growing the ways in which we engage with the community as we settle into collaborating as a team. Workforce diversity, workforce management, knowledge organization, and the roots and causes of institutional racism

in U.S. libraries (KLA)

This talk examines three critical factors that structure and perpetuate institutional and systemic racism in US libraries: (1) the erasure of the reality of early workforce diversity in the building of the nation and its institutions; (2) the central role of chattel slavery in the origins and development of modern management theory and practice; and (3) the inherent biases of systems of library knowledge classification and organization that originated in the Jim Crow era of US history. This wide-ranging historical overview and analysis aims to expose how libraries embody systems of discrimination and perpetuate them through standard and routine practices of knowledge collection, organization, management, and dissemination. It does not offer a specific prescription for remediating these complex problems. Instead, it aims to make librarians aware of hidden or ignored dimensions and mechanisms of structural inequality in libraries and librarianship.
