The area which is now the Carson Center was once a thriving produce and business center of Paducah.

Jack will take us to the days of the Market House and the blocks from Kentucky to Washington when it was the heart of the produce and rail businesses. Jack Johnston was born and raised in Paducah and he, along with his brother Bob, were part of the Johnston Brokerage at the Freight House for decades. Jack collects Paducah memorabilia and is very knowledgeable about the history of Paducah.

With more than 55 million people worldwide living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, and many more serving as their caregivers, it's essential for library staff to learn how to support these community members. This webinar offers a comprehensive overview of Alzheimer's dementia and practical advice on meeting the needs of both those with dementia and their caregivers.

## World Alzheimer's Report:

The 2024 <u>World Alzheimer's Report</u> explores the results of an international survey analyzed by the London School of Economics and Political Science. The survey included more than 40,000 responses from people living with dementia, care partners, health care practitioners and the general public from more than 166 countries and territories. The report spotlights global perspectives on changing attitudes towards dementia through essays, case studies and research findings. The report also highlights how different communities and individuals experience and address dementia stigma.

Kentucky's state opioid grant application portal is set to reopen soon and KNN invites you to walkthough the application and ask questions of Chris Evans and Jessie Halladay with the Kentucky Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission on our <u>Thursday</u>, <u>12/5 Virtual Town Hall Meeting at 10:30am ET</u>. As part of the national opioid settlement fund, Kentucky received approximately \$900 million. Half of these funds are being distributed via a state grant program for treatment, prevention, and intervention. The grant application portal will open December 2 and the deadline to apply is January 17.

# Telehealth 101: What libraries need to know (January 6 - 31, 2025)

Summary: This class introduces telehealth, why it's important, and how it enables people to have greater access to quality healthcare. Explore how different libraries provided patrons in their communities with access to telehealth services.

#### Date: 01/20/2025 6:00 AM EST

Summary: Join us for this 2-week, 4 credit-hour online class to discover ways to improve your own personal well-being and create a healthy workplace. We will discuss ways to increase overall wellness for all staff in libraries so that we have happy, healthy, and safe work environments. This class meets the NLM national initiative of environmental determinants of health by addressing aspects of the work environment by providing health information resources available through MedlinePlus and the National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health and increasing health information access.

## Wikipedia + Libraries: NNLM (January 21 - February 21, 2025)

#### Date: 01/21/2025 8:00 AM EST

Summary: Gain insight into the value of Wikipedia as a viable reference and build the skills and knowledge needed to evaluate articles, with a specific focus on health and medical topics in a self-paced, online class over four weeks. Expect to spend about 2 hours a week exploring through discussion forums, readings, tutorials, and learn about the #CiteNLM Wikipedia edit-a-thon and the free resources, programming and training that NNLM offers to libraries. This class addresses increasing health information access and use, and the NNLM initiatives of confronting health misinformation and citizen science by engaging communities in editing Wikipedia health-related articles with well-sourced additions, and gaining insight into the value of Wikipedia as a viable reference tool for health and medical topics.
