

Kidbrarians: A New Approach to Engaging Those Increasingly Unavailable Tweens

After finding that traditional after-school programming for school-aged kids was no longer working, I made some changes, including developing a new flexible program to engage those who were not attending traditional programs. Amid the Tomes of Candlekeep: Hosting Tabletop Role-playing Games for Local Libraries

Tabletop role-playing games (RPGs) like Dungeons and Dragons are experiencing a surge of interest, and local libraries are uniquely equipped to engage their communities with this form of modern interactive storytelling. Bikers Against Child Abuse (BACA): Empowering Children to Not Be Afraid of the World in Which They Live

Bikers Against Child Abuse (BACA) is an international organization dedicated to creating a safer environment for children who have experienced abuse. Comprised of a network of bikers, BACA's mission is to empower these children to overcome fear and regain control of their lives. Each child is paired with 'BACA Primaries,' bikers who are available 24/7 to provide both emotional and physical support, fostering a sense of security and belonging. BACA collaborates closely with local and state authorities tasked with child protection. Referrals come through various channels, including Community Action Councils, police departments, prosecutors, and other child-focused entities, such as public libraries, ensuring comprehensive support for these young survivors.



Maggie Myers lives in Danville, KY and is in her fourth year as a Regional Program Manager with the Division of Family Resources and Youth Services Centers, providing training and support to FRYSC Coordinators in 13 Kentucky counties. Her prior work includes serving children and families as a FRYSC Coordinator, a School Counselor, and a Programs Coordinator for her local public library! Maggie has a Bachelor's Degree in Education from Eastern Kentucky University and a Master's in School Counseling from Liberty University.
