Collection Assessment and Diversity Analysis

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What is CCPL's Collection Assessment?

- Conducted every two years since 2010
- Measures the Quality of the collection
- Analyzes CCPL's collection size, age, and usage
- Compares the collection with library standards and local demographic data
- Identifies problem areas
- Informs future selection, deselection, and budgeting

- Age of the Collection



- CREW Continuous Review, Evaluation and Weeding
- Look closely at items in Dewey areas that age more quickly
- Average vs. Median dates
- Shelf life: 1-3 Years (Ideal median date = 2021)
- Shelf Life: 5 Years (Ideal median date = 2020)
- Shelf Life: 10 Years (Ideal median date = 2018)

Relative Use

- Total circulation increased by 9%

- Alexandria is operating as planned
- Kentucky Libraries Unbound continues to grow
- Newport has a great collection, despite low circulation
- Nonfiction needs review everywhere

CCPL Diversity Audit

- In 2022 CCPL conducted a diversity audit of its Young Adult Fiction collection
- A diversity audit is an inventory of a collection that gathers concrete data to measure how much diversity that collection contains
- The data from an audit can be used to see what areas of the collection need to be better developed and advocated for
- Karen Jensen (creator of Teen Librarian Toolbox) asserts that an audit's goal is not "to hit a specific number" but "to get an idea of what your collection looks like, where you have gaps, and where internalized biases might exist"

Before the Audit

- Before the actual audit was conducted baseline data was gathered
- Baseline data is needed both to get a picture of your library's service area and to later compare with results of audit
- Census data for both Campbell County, KY and for the United States as a whole were gathered in order to obtain numbers on specific demographics and to get a picture of the library's service population

Note about Census Data

- Vast majority of the Campbell County population is white (94%) but does not mean that 94% of the YA fiction should represent white people
- Kelly Jensen: "whatever our immediate service community may look like, our goal is to have diverse/inclusive collections to create global citizens"
- Rudine Sims Bishop: "when there are enough books available that can act as both mirrors and windows for all of our children, they will see that we can celebrate both our differences and similarities, because together they are what make us all human"

Scope of Audit

- There is no set standard for what categories/demographics need to be covered in an audit, so you can look at any area you want
- Goal of this audit was to see how representative YA Fictions is of groups that are not white, heterosexual, cisgender, non-disabled, Christian people
- Identities of both authors and protagonist were examined
 - Made conscious choice not to include secondary characters in assessment in order to avoid tokenization skewing the results
- 18 categories were examined for authors and 19 categories were examined for protagonists

Categories Selected to Audit

Race/Ethnicity

- White Only (or presumed white when there are no racial descriptors, white is the assumed default)
- Black/African American
- Asian/Asian American or Pacific Islander
- Hispanic/Latine (Latine is a genderneutral substitute for Latino/a)
- Native American/Indigenous
- Middle Eastern/North African (MENA)
- Biracial/Multiracial

Gender and Sexuality

- Male
- Female
- Nonbinary/Genderqueer/Genderfluid
- LGBTQIA+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, queer, intersex, asexual)

Categories Selected to Audit

Religion

- Jewish
- Muslim
- Other non-Christian religions (ex: Hinduism, Buddhism)

Physical & Mental Health

- Physical disabilities
- Neurodivergence (ex: Autism Spectrum Disorder, dyslexia, ADHD, OCD, Tourette's Syndrome)
- Mental Health (ex: depression, anxiety, eating disorders, trauma, addiction, grief)

Categories Selected to Audit


- For a handful of authors no background information was found, so "Race/Ethnicity Unknown" was added to the author categories
- "Other Non-white" was added for protagonists whose race was not white but otherwise ambiguous, and "Non-human/Non-humanoid" was included for protagonists who were animals or mythical creatures (note: this did not include characters who were creatures like vampires or fairies because they were still humanoid)


- Auditing entire collection not practical but a sample can provide a snapshot at the state of the collection which is still valuable data
- Of the 6,819 circulating YA Fiction books a sample of 871 titles were randomly selected to audit (10% of the 3 main branches' collections plus the entirety of YA novels at express branch)

- Downloaded dataset of all of the collection's YA fiction books and their authors into Excel spreadsheet
- Used random number generator to pick the 871 titles for the sample
- Two spreadsheets with the sample titles and categories were created for each of CCPL's 4 branches: one for authors, one for protagonists
- Information on the author(s) and protagonist(s) was researched for each title
 - For authors, sources included authors' official websites and social media accounts
 - For protagonists, professional book reviews were the main information source (Novelist proved to be an invaluable source as it had professional book reviews and listed themes and subject headings for titles)
 - Important to note that data collected in audit is only as accurate as the information that is available


- For each instance of one of the audited categories, the title would get marked on the appropriate Excel spreadsheet
- Once the all of the data for was collected, totals and percentages for each category were calculated by dividing the number of titles in a category by the number of titles in the sample (this was done for each branch's sample data in addition to the systemwide sample data as a whole)


Results: Racial/Ethnic Background







Results: Gender and Sexuality







Results: Religion

Conclusions

- Results reveal that heteronormative, able-bodied, neurotypical white women dominate CCPL's YA fiction collection as both authors and protagonists
- Suggestions to make collection more diverse:
 - Use diversity audit to inform future ordering: see where the gaps are and order to increase representation for certain groups
 - Do "mini-audits" of book orders
 - Weed collection



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
