Make a Valentine craft and participate in a STEM project! Work at your own pace and take home instructions on how to make more crafts at home!





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

Review test taking strategies and test content. Participants will take portions of a practice test!





#### **Cradle School**

Children learn and play with their parents to prepare them for Kindergarten!







#### FRYSCs: The History

 Kentucky's Family Resource and Youth Services Centers were established as a part of the historic Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990.

 The FRYSCs remain programmatically intact as originally implemented within KERA.



#### FRYSCs: The Mission

- To create and sustain partnerships that promote:
  - –early learning and successful transition into school;
  - academic achievement and well-being while in school;
  - -graduation and transition to adult life.



#### FRYSCs: The Vision

 The Division of Family Resource and Youth Services Centers in the Cabinet for Health and Family Services shall establish the national standard of excellence in the provision of school-based family support.




#### FRYSCs: The Focus

- The focus of the individual center is to "remove noncognitive barriers to learning".
- The programs, activities, and services of centers are to be designed locally to meet the needs of students and families so as to "enhance students' abilities to succeed" in school.
- Underlying themes of the FRYSC programs are:
  - -- increased parent involvement
  - -- service brokerage for students and families
  - -- broader community development



## FRYSCs: The Partnerships





### FRYSCs: The Funding

- Based on the number of students eligible for free school meals on December 1 of each year.
- Currently \$183.86 per student per year
- An assumed minimum of 180 students.
- An assumed maximum of 450 students.



## Funding Hints

- Funding is based on an annual December 1 free meal count
- Funding is contingent upon the biennial budget approved by the General Assembly



#### FRYSCs: The Work Plans

- Centers submit a Continuation Application every two years.
- Core components required in authorizing legislation must be addressed in the plan.
- Centers must conduct a needs assessment to determine how to address the components.
- Centers also have "Optional Components" that address the unique needs of their school community
- Action Components are becoming more outcomedriven.



## The Components

#### **FRC**

- Preschool child care for 2-3 year olds
- Child care for 4-12 year olds after school and summer
- Families in Training
- Family Literacy
- Health Services

#### **YSC**

- Referrals to health and social services
- Summer/Part-time Job Development (high school)
- Career education and development
- Substance abuse education and counseling
- Family crisis and mental health counseling



#### Why Advisory Councils are Important

- The Advisory Council is the foundation of all successful Family Resource/Youth Service Centers!!!
  - It is critical to the ongoing growth and development of the FRYSC.
  - The Council serves as that body that assists the center coordinator in fulfilling the mission of the Center.
  - It is essential in assuring that community, parent and school input occurs in the planning, implementation and oversight of the Center's activities.



### **FRYSCs: The Advisory Council**

- Each center must have a functioning advisory council
- Advisory councils keep the program "community-centered" rather than "coordinator-centered"
- The council provides a broad base of support for the center
- The council provides input and oversight in the planning, implementation and evaluation of center services and activities.

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


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
