• Currently about 40 chapters

• Organize advocacy efforts

• Start and mentor Friends chapters

• Hold annual meeting

How can a Friends chapter support a public library?

- Additional source of revenue
 - Support for particular program or service
 - Meet unbudgeted needs that arise during the year
 - Pay for items outside of tax revenue
- More volunteers
- Qualifying for grants
- Advocacy

Friends groups require nurture and care

• Not turnkey

• Require understanding of roles by both parties

• Need regular communication

• Organized with appropriate documents

Legal relationship between Library and Friends

- Legally separate organizations
 - Separate boards
 - Separate leadership
 - Separate finances
 - Separate reporting
 - Separate audits

• Memorandum of agreement will set boundaries

How to start?

- 1. Develop a plan
 - a. Identify your needs (what do you expect Friends to do for the library)
 - b. Discuss plans with board and staff
 - c. Determine which resources will be needed for Friends
 - i. Staff contact is vitally important
 - ii. Space
 - iii. Other depending on your identified need

How to start?

2. Recruit a core team (6-10 members)

These are the folks who will get your Friends off the ground.

Possible sources of team members:

- People who attend programs
- Former trustees or prospective trustees
- Former staff
- Current volunteers
- Place article in newspaper
- Posters around library
- Get the word out

How to start?

- 3. Organize core team
 - Share expectations and learn their interests
 - Identify temporary officers
 - Create By-laws
 - Create memorandum of agreement with library board
 - File paperwork with Secretary of State
