Definition of Probate

 Probate is the "court procedure by which a will is proved to be valid or invalid" and encompasses "all matters and proceedings pertaining to the administration of estates, guardianships, etc. (Blacks Law Dictionary)

Types of Probate Records

- Wills
- Bonds
- Petitions
- Accounts
- Inventories

- Administrations
- Orders
- Decrees
- Distributions

Will

- A document in which a person specifies the method to be applied in the management and distribution of his estate after his death.
- Filed in County Court

Order Books – Record the Activities of the Estate

- Date the Will was entered in to the Court
- Names of people appearing in Court
 - Presented the Will
 - Witnesses to the Will
- Settlements and Statements of associated Accounts
- Guardian of children (if necessary)

Executor and Administrator Bonds

- Executor: typically appointed by the deceased, if he left a will (includes relationship information)
- Administrator: court appointed
- Guardian: if minor children are involved
 - May not be the mother
 - Women could not always act for themselves legally
 - Doesn't necessarily mean that the mother was dead, unfit, or unable to care for her children

Appraisals and Inventories

- Appraisals committee of 2-3 would be appointed if a settlement was necessary
- Men often neighbors or "trusted citizens"
- Submit an inventory to the County Court
 - Included the value of each item in the estate
 - May be recorded w/ the will or in a separate volume called "Inventories and Settlements" or "Inventories and Appraisements"

Sales and Settlements

- Sale of the estate
- Record the items sold, its price, and the name of the purchaser
- Purchaser's were typically relatives and neighbors
 - Sale record may contain clues about relatives and the husbands of married daughters
- Once sale is complete, the estate will be settled
 - All heirs will be listed w/ their spouses
 - If land is involved, those would be recorded in deed records

Intestate Settlements

- Intestate = without a will
- May be records related to the estate
 - Administrator would still have to be appointed
 - Settlement if property was involved
 - Deed Records!
- Commissioner's Deeds
 - Power to settle estate if heirs are unwilling or unable to reach an agreement

Contesting a Will

- Suit would be filed in Circuit Court
- May include depositions
- Relationships established
- Suits for settlement of an estate were very common
