

FOOD INSECURITY IN THE U.S.




More than 47 million people in the US face hunger, including 1 in 5 children.



Hunger is more common in rural areas due to lack of transportation and other resources.





In 2023 alone, more than 50 million people turned to food assistance for extra help.


FOOD INSECURITY IN KENTUCKY

Highest rate in the nation among older adults 50 - 59, at 17.3%. The national average is 10.6%.



In 2022, SNAP helped feed 12% of KY's population, 1 in 8 people.

SNAP OUTREACH


...raises awareness about SNAP and helps eligible individuals and families apply for and access SNAP benefits. This includes locally grown and culturally relevant food.

Every 5% increase in the number of families receiving SNAP benefits was associated with an 8% to 14% reduction in CPS & foster care caseloads (Chapin Hall)



Your neighbors are hungry. Kentucky faces significant hunger challenges. 10 of the nation's 25 most food-insecure counties are in Central and Eastern Kentucky.

However, we focus on populations that are often underserved.

- Students
 - Focus on Institutes of Higher Learning (IHE)
- Veterans
 - More likely to experience food insecurity; states can collaborate with local Veterans Health Administration (VHA) to connect them to SNAP.
- Older Adults/Seniors
 - Historically lower SNAP participation: outreach can reduce barriers such as technology, mobility, stigma, and misconceptions about eligibility, including support for kinship caregivers.
- Immigrant and Mixed Status Households
 - Address language barriers, transportation issues, unfamiliarity with organizations, or need for specialized services.

SIMPLIFIED ASSISTANCE FOR THE ELDERLY

otherwise known as "SAFE"

Simplified Assistance for the Elderly caters to KY residents that are single (1 person household) or married (2 - person household) that are **60 and older** who must receive SSI . This program does not contribute to anyone in the home that is not a spouse, does not receive SSI and below the age of 60.



ELDERLY SIMPLIFIED APPLICATION PROGRAM

otherwise known as "ESAP"

Elderly Simplified Application Project, provides assistance to households in which all adult members **are 60 years or older and/or disabled with no earned income**. ESAP is a imed for those individuals who primarily receive RSDI income only and can have dependents in the household.

Senior participation in SNAP is low, with only 4.8 million older adults enrolled. This represents less than half of eligible seniors. Approximately 3 out of 5 eligible seniors, or about 5 million seniors, do not apply for the program.



SNAP OUTREACH IMPACT

This money is supposed to supplement my food budget but it is really all of my food budget because my income barely convers my rent. Because of SNAP, we are not starving.

We needed the proverbial leg up. We used it, and today my brothers and I are all fully employed taxpayers who support ourselves and our families.

A program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that helps people make healthier food choices and live more active lives.

Designed for individuals and all family members who receive SNAP, the program offers free cooking classes, resources, and education on how to shop for and cook nutritious foods safely on a budget as well as ways to be more physically active.

STATE NUTRITION ACTION COUNCIL (SNAC)

In 2017, the USDA required states to establish State Nutrition Action Councils (SNAC) to unify nutrition and obesity prevention efforts. SNACs improve nutrition education and promote collaboration among SNAP-Ed agencies, FNS nutrition programs, public health organizations, and community partners. Their initiatives focus on teamwork and integrated strategies to optimize resources and reduce redundancy.



What is...

SNAP EMPLOYMENT & TRAINING (E&T)

A program offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that assists individuals participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). This initiative aims to empower people by providing them with skills, education, training, and support to obtain meaningful, long term employment and reach self sufficiency.





SNAP EMPLOYMENT & TRAINING (E&T) BASICS

The program is designed for individuals whose needs and goals are aligned with services offered.

ELIGIBILITY

• Participating in the SNAP program • Between 16 and 59 years of age . • Willing to participate in the program . *Voluntary • Eligible to work - meets state/federal requirements. • Meet general eligibility screening criteria.

SNAP E&T COMPONENTS

- Integrated Education & Training/Bridge Programs

With SNAP E&T, participants have access to training, education, and support services designed to help them enter or advance in the workforce. SNAP E&T aims to eliminate obstacles by offering support services, such as transportation.

SNAP E&T COLLABORATION

SNAP E&T coordinates and consults with local workforce agencies, educational institutions, and community organizations, to establish a stronger support network tailored to individuals' needs. This collaborative approach provides greater access to skills training, career counseling, and job placement services, while addressing barriers, such as childcare and transportation. By aligning resources and expertise, SNAP E&T participants become empowered and equipped to obtain meaningful employment, promoting economic independence.

SNAP E&T offers a pathway toward opportunity.





SNAP EMPLOYMENT & TRAINING CAN UNLOCK A WORLD OF OPPORTUNITIES

The USDA and advocacy groups have highlighted how SNAP E&T has the potential to break cycles of poverty by equipping people with the skills and resources needed to secure long-term employment, which reduces food insecurity and promotes economic stability.

Research has shown that stable parental employment leads to a reduction in child maltreatment (Schneider, 2024).









DCBS SNAP **KYNECTORS**

... are trained citizens that work through an approved organization and aid individuals who are applying for benefits.

FOOD SECURITY IS A PREVENTION PATHWAY

In FY 2023, SNAP served an average of 42.1 million participants per month. Federal SNAP spending totaled \$112.8 billion and benefits averaged \$211.93 per participant per month.

• In 2022, SNAP benefits and emergency allotments raised 30% of SNAP households above poverty

 10% decrease in food insecurity (2022) • 98% of children on SNAP qualified for direct certification for the National free and reduced lunch program (2022).

How Libraries Can Help

Information & Application Assistance

•Workshops & Info Sessions: Host events where people can learn about SNAP, eligibility, and how to apply.
•One-on-One Help: Partner with DCBS in filling out SNAP applications online or on paper.
•Multilingual Support: Provide forms and help in multiple languages common in your community.

Nutrition & Food Education

•Cooking Classes: Collaborate with local chefs, SNAP-Ed educators, or health departments to host cooking demos focused on using EBT-friendly ingredients.

•Meal Planning Resources: Provide books, handouts, and online tools for healthy meal prep on a SNAP budget. •Encourage library card usage for meal planning, cookbooks.

Farmers' Market Partnerships

Promote and partner with farmers' markets that accept EBT/SNAP.
Set up mini farmers' markets at or near the library if space and partnerships allow.

Outreach & Partnerships

Partner with local food banks, SNAP-Ed educators, WIC programs, or nonprofits for co-hosted events/services.
Provide outreach – maximize mobile libraries.
