Arnosky, Jim. Otters Underwater. Putnam, 1992. This book shows two young otters frolicking and feeding in a pond.

Craig, Janet. What's Under the Ocean? Troll, 1982. Brief text and pictures show the plants and animals that live in the ocean.

Kalan, Robert. *Blue Sea*. Greenwillow, 1979. Progressively larger fish are chased by and escape from the biggest fish.

Martin, David. The Fish Book. Golden Press, 1964.

A very basic introduction to animals that live in and around the sea. The book has very large pictures.

Ruschak, Lynette. *One Hot Day*. Artists and Writers Guild, 1994. One hot day, the shiniest jungle bug hops by the largest gorilla, setting off a pop up chain reaction.

Wylie, Joanne. *Fishy Color Story*. Children's Press, 1983. A child introduces the colors while answering questions about a beautiful fish.
