- related children's books


All children love to sing and learn, so the book includes both English language learner strategies and special needs adaptations.

Taking a Trip Flannelboard Story

Pieces Needed: Bear, train, boat, airplane, bus, car, hot air balloon, roller skates On Sunday Bradley Bear told his mother that he wanted to go to Disneyland. "I want to ride on Space Mountain," said Bradley. "How will you get there?" asked his mother. I'm going to take the train," he declared. "Have a good time," called his mother.

On Monday, he told his father he was going to the beach. 'I want to look for seashells and fly my kite", said Bradley. "How will you get there?" asked his father. I'll sail on a boat" he explained. "Don't forget your bathing suit," laughed his father.

On Tuesday he told his mother that he thought he would visit his grandmother because she was always glad to see him. "How will you get there?" asked his mother. "I'll zoom in an airplane in the sky", he shouted. "Tell her I said hello," smiled his mother.

On Wednesday Bradley planned a trip to the zoo. "I like to watch the elephants," he said. His mother asked how he would get to the zoo. "I'll wait at the bus stop for the bus," he said. "Be home for lunch," joked his mother.

On Thursday Bradley wanted to go camping in the mountains. "I like to sleep in a tent with my sleeping bag," he said. "How will you get there?" asked his father. "I'll go in a car and drive to the mountains," said Bradley. "Drive carefully, laughed his father.

On Friday he wished for a trip to the moon. "How will you get to the moon?" questioned his mother. "I'll float high in the sky in a hot air balloon," he said. "Sounds like fun," his mother told him.

On Saturday he said, "Today I'm going next door to play with my friend." "How will you get there?" asked his father. I'm going on my roller skates," said Bradley. "Have a good time, said his father. "I will," shouted Bradley, "because I'm really going."

Sensory and Movement Activities

Road Builders: Cut out different road shapes in black construction paper. Draw yellow traffic lines through the middle. Let the children work together to build roads and drive matchbook cars on them.

Tire Tracks: Lay butcher paper on the floor. Use a rubber band or tape to attach a colored marker to the back of a toy car or truck. Make sure the marker touches the ground so that when the children push it, it will leave a track behind.

Things That Roll: Provide a basket of things that roll (cars, skates, a pizza wheel, rolling pin, and so on) and items that don't roll. Help the children sort the items—those

that roll and those that don't. Encourage younger children to just explore the rolling items.

Sound Center: Provide musical items that make sounds, such as bells, drums, rhythm band instruments, horns, shakers, and so on. Encourage the children to make sounds with the items and then describe the sounds they make. Do any of the sounds sound like the sounds mentioned in "The Wheels on the Bus?"

All Around the Town: Help children build a town with blocks. Make paper bag houses by turning brown paper lunch bags upside down and drawing buildings on them. Add paper bag houses, trees, toy people, and plastic animals. Provide a toy bus and have the children drive the bus "all around the town." You might want to suggest that they sing "The Wheels on the Bus" as they make their way through town.

Traffic Lights Game

This is a variation on Red Light, Green Light. In a large space children move round depending on the instruction given. GREEN means run, YELLOW means walk and RED means stop. When the children are used to this you can start picking children out who are slow at following the instruction. Children can also take turns in shouting out the colors.

Storytime Travels

Take youngsters on a journey in which their imagination is their guide. Have students sit in a circle. Provide each child with a plastic plate. Have him hold the plate and pretend that it's a steering wheel. Then tell students that they will be going on imaginary vacations. Ask a volunteer to give a vacation destination--such as Grandmother's house or the beach--and a mode of transportation--such as car or train. As the children steer their vehicles, encourage them to tell about the people, places, and things they see on their trip. After this trip has been completed, ask another volunteer to make the next destination and transportation suggestion. Off we go!

Freeze Dance

Make a stop sign...you can use a ping pong game paddle covered with red paper with the word stop in white letters or a popsicle stick. On the reverse side make it green with the word GO. Play music and dance. When you flip the sign from green to STOP everyone freezes.

Ramps

Make several ramps of different heights for your children to play with. Ask them which one makes the cars go faster. See if they can tell you why. If not tell them why.

Tracks a Wheel Makes

Let the children drive toy vehicles through several different substances (water, paint, mud, shaving cream, silly putty, etc) Talk to them about the different tracks that is made in the different substances.

Rolling Jars

Get several clear jars of the same size. Put different small materials in each one (a marble, crayon, block, pencil, etc.). Let the children roll them around discuss with them how the items affect the jars ability to roll.

Craft Ideas

Make a Road: Print out clip art cars and cut out about 4 for each child. Cut out roads from black construction paper, draw traffic yellow lines on them, and glue them onto green construction paper. Have the children glue the cars to the road.

My Own Traffic Lights

Let the children design their own red light out of different colors of construction paper. Then let them create a scene to go along with their red light.

My Map

Show the children several maps. Have them design their own maps. They could draw a map of their room, the library, or an imaginary place.

Car Air Freshener

Draw a shape or trace a large cookie cutter on a piece of cardboard. Cut out the shape. Use it to trace and cut out two replicas of felt. Glue one felt piece on either side of the cardboard. Add felt decorations. Rub 10 - 15 drops of essential oil onto the felt. Poke a hole in the top, thread with string.

Transportation, Colors and Number Matching

Create a "parking lot" by drawing parking spaces on a sheet of paper. Give each child 4 car cutouts, one each of red, blue, green, yellow with the numbers 1,2,3,4 on them. Label the slots 1,2,3,4. The child is supposed to: Match the cars to the right number, then color the slot the correct color. Then glue the car onto the colored spot.

Tracks

Let children roll various cars (with different types of wheels) through paint and then run across their paper. This will make different types of tire tracks. The cars included in this kit are designed with this in mind. Their wheels create different patterns.

Wagon Wheel Collages

Use wagon wheel macaroni, dye them different colors (food coloring and water, let them soak and then dry out) children glue them to their paper. Or have them use the pasta as stampers on paper.

Road Maps

Use real road maps and have the children put cutouts of cars on them.

Wheels on the Car

Give the children cars or trucks cut from construction paper and two wheels each. Punch holes and apply brads to create cars and trucks with moveable wheels.
