Pam Schiller's <u>Starting With Stories</u> is an excellent resource to use in developing storytimes for the diverse audiences you will encounter in public libraries.

Pages 88-89 Freight Train

- Provide construction paper, scissors, glue, and rectangle and circle templates.
 Suggest that the children trace the templates to make train cars and wheels.
 Provide a sheet of butcher paper and black and brown strips of construction paper for a track. Encourage the children to make a track on the paper and then glue train cars onto the track.
- Cut a train engine and several train cars from construction paper. Place the letters of the alphabet on each car. Challenge children to attach the trains by placing the letters in alphabetical order. Ask questions: Which letter is on the front car? Which letter is on the back car. Try this activity with numbers instead of letters.
- Provide a tape recorder and empty paper towel tubes. Encourage the children to use the paper towel tubes to make sounds like train whistles. Suggest that they also record the train whistle sounds that they make, and their attempts to copy the clacking sound of the train wheels on the track.

Pages 120-121 The Little Engine that Could

- Make an inclined plank. Give the children items to roll down the plank. Provide some rolling toys, such as cars and trucks and even trains. Encourage the children to roll the vehicles up and down the plank. Ask, which is easier—up or down?
- Print "I can" on a piece of chart paper. Encourage the children to use magnetic letters or felt letters to copy the phrase.



Little Red Train

The "engine" calls for a "car" to hook on. Repeat the chant. The second person calls a third to hook on. Continue until everyone has completed the train.

Sensory and Movement Activities

Musical Train Seats: Set your classroom chairs up like on a train (two seats facing forward, two seats facing backwards, two seats facing forward, etc.) Have everyone seated except one student to either blow a train whistle or hit the switch to start the music. Then have that person jump in the circle of students. Listen to a snippet of "I've Been Working on the Railroad" as the students walk slowly around the train seats. When you turn off the music, all students will try to be seated quickly, but you'll be one chair short. The person left standing will be the one to blow the whistle or start the music for the next round.

Flannel Boards, etc.

Train Patterns

[Math]

Children work in pairs, each choosing one color of the Unifix cubes to work with. The children make an AB pattern: one child adding one color and the other adding the next color, taking turns adding to the train.

Unifix Trains: Have students create "trains" with Unifix cubes to match a number. I have Unifix number caps that we're going to use as the "engine."



Name Trains

[Literacy]

Children glue squares with the letters of their name onto a strip of construction paper to make a name "train". We add a paper engine and draw on the wheels.



Scissor Skills

[Fine Motor Skills]

Children pretend the scissors are a train, cutting along the railroad tracks (straight, curved & jagged lines). They stop when they come to the animal sticker.



Craft Project Directions:

What you will need: Animal crackers, glue, construction paper, roll of paper. Take the construction paper and cut it into long strips to make an animal circus train. Next cut the long

strips into separate rectangles (individual train cars) and then cut small rectangles out of them to make windows and places to put animal crackers. Leave one of the train cars solid and cut an end of it at a diagonal to make the engine of the train. Next roll out a long piece of paper that you can glue your train cars onto. Now assemble your train- glue the cars in place, glue in animal crackers to the cars, add wheels with crayon or by gluing down pre-cut circles and decorate.



Craft Project Directions:

To make this craft project you will need colored construction paper, scissors, tape, glue, cotton balls, crayons, and a pen or pencil to trace your arm and hand. To begin take two pieces of colored construction and tape them together end to end to create

a background for your train. Next take another piece of colored construction paper and trace your hand and your arm. Make sure when you trace your hand you keep your thumb flush with your palm. Now take another piece of colored construction paper and trace the rest of your arm. Now cut out your hand print and square off the palm. This will become the train's engine and lead your train down the track. Next take your arm tracings and cut them out and them cut them into train car sections. Now arrange the train and train cars in a row on the background piece of paper. Glue or tape them in place. Next cut out a smoke stack and many wheels for your train. Glue them in place. Now you are ready to decorate your train. Add colors with your crayons, puffs of smoke with your cotton balls, windows with pieces of paper, and more! Have Fun Heading Down the Track!
