# DBC 17595 | All Things Bright and Strange by James Markert | Narrated by Norma Rash

The people of Bellhaven have always looked to Ellsworth Newberry for guidance, but after losing his wife and his future as a professional pitcher, he is moments away from testing his mortality. Until he notices the changes in town. Upon the discovery of a small chapel deep in the Bellhaven woods, healing seems to fall upon the townspeople, bringing peace in the wake of WWI. But as they visit the "healing floor" more frequently, people begin to turn on one another. Ellsworth must overcome his demons and face the truth of who he was born to be by leading the town into the woods to face the evil threatening Bellhaven. 2018. Adult. Unrated. Approximate reading time: 10 hours, 12 minutes.

# DBC 17634 | An Uncommon Woman by Laura Frantz | Narrated by Sally Smothermon

Unflinching and plainspoken, Tessa Swan is not your typical 18th-century woman. Born and bred on the Western Virginia frontier along with her five brothers, she is a force to be reckoned with. Quiet and courageous, Clay Tygart is not your typical 18th-century man. Raised by Lenape Indians, he returns a hero from the French and Indian War. Determined to avoid any romantic entanglements as fort commander, Clay remains aloof whenever he encounters the lovely Tessa. But when she is taken captive by the tribe Clay left, his hand, and heart, are forced, leading to one very private and one very public reckoning. Adult. Approx. reading time: 11 hours, 9 minutes.

# DBC 17651 | *The Marble Orchard* by Alex Taylor | Narrated by Norma Rash

Beam, the black sheep of the Sheetmire family, a large and entrenched rural Kentucky clan, finds himself on the run after killing a man who was trying to rob him, a man who turns out to be the son of Loat Duncan, a powerful local businessman and cold-blooded killer. With Loat who is hiding a devastating secret about Beam's past and Elvis, the local sheriff, hot on his trail, Beam leads a nomadic existence as he descends deeper into his own heart of darkness, slipping from one place to the next, each more mysterious than the last. The people he meets during his journey an enigmatic trucker dressed in a suit, a cemetery-dwelling Good Samaritan, an armless brothel owner are pieces of a puzzle that hold the key to Beam's past, as well as his possible future salvation. 2015. Adult. Explicit descriptions of sex. Strong language. Violence. Approximate reading time: 7 hours, 44 minutes.

## DBC 29402 | Rhythm and Bluegrass by Molly Harper | Narrated by Mary Vaughn

Kentucky Tourism Commission employee Bonnie Turkle is up Mud Creek without a paddle. When she gets permission from the state historical society to restore McBride's Music Hall in Mud Creek, Kentucky, to its former glory, she thinks the community will welcome her with open arms. Instead, her plans interfere with a proposal to sell the property to a factory that would bring much-needed jobs to the town. Even though Bonnie is trying to preserve Mayor Will McBride's family heritage, he is more concerned withthe welfare of his people than the past. Will finds her optimistic

sentimentality extremely annoying but that doesn't stop him from kissing Bonnie senseless. With a deadline looming and local saboteurs ruining her restoration, Bonnie must find a way to compromise with Will to save McBride's and the town, while hopefully winning a few more kisses in the process! 2013. Adult. Unrated. Approx. reading time: 7 hours, 56 minutes.

with people who are handling visual or physical conditions with strength and hope, and their zeal for continued learning, growth and engagement inspires me. It's a pleasure to be able to provide the materials they need and want to read.

### What led you to KTBL? Where have you worked in the past?

I worked for 16 years in a variety of capacities in public libraries in both Lexington and Danville, including technical Services, circulation, reference, and bookmobile services. I earned my Masters of Library and Information Science degree in 2006, and determined early in my education that what I enjoyed most were elements of my job that incorporated outreach. A move to Talking Books seemed ideal, and I'm so happy to be here.

#### What do you like to do when you're not at work?

I enjoy spending time with my family. My husband and I have two adult children who we love to see when possible, and three cats who enjoy our attention otherwise! Most recently I've been busy developing a new hobby – Revolutionary War/Colonial history reenactment and related activities in recognition of Revolutionary War veterans and other influential figures at the dawn of American history. ### What do you do when you're not volunteering?

"In my spare time I enjoy reading (of course), gardening, fishing and watching baseball games on television [editor's note: can confirm! Richard and I have had many conversations about the Cincinnati Reds.]."
