KTBL WELCOMES FRANK X WALKER

In October 2024, KTBL was honored to welcome former Kentucky Poet Laureate and current University of Kentucky professor Frank X Walker to narrate his seminal work *Affrilachia* in our studio.

Walker coined the term "Affrilachia," which is now widely used to refer to the cultural contributions of African American authors, writers, and musicians in Appalachia. He cofounded The Affrilachian Poets and was the founding editor of "pluck! The Journal of Affrilachian Arts & Culture." In 2013, he was the first African American to be named Kentucky's Poet Laureate.

We appreciate Frank taking time out of his busy schedule to come in and provide us with the authoritative voice for this important work.

Affrilachia is now available for digital download on BARD and through the mail on cartridge. It will also soon be available in braille from NLS.

WHAT IS OCLC?

Have you ever heard the letters "OCLC" at the end of a book description and wondered what it meant?

In 1967 when OCLC was founded, the letters stood for **O**hio **C**ollege **L**ibrary **C**enter. As the organization grew, OCLC came to stand for **O**nline **C**omputer **L**ibrary **C**enter. Today, the organization is simply known as **OCLC** and it provides member libraries with a variety of programs, services, and resources that help libraries function. This can include cataloging information like book summaries, which is why it sometimes appears in our book descriptions.

DBC29437 | Affrilachia

written and narrated by Frank X Walker

A milestone book of poetry at the intersection of Appalachian and African American literature. In this pathbreaking debut collection, poet Frank X Walker tells the story of growing up young, Black, artistic, and male in one of America's most misunderstood geographical regions. As a proud Kentucky native, Walker created the word "Affrilachia" to render visible the unique intersectional experience of African Americans living in the rural and Appalachian South. Since its publication in 2000, Affrilachia has seen wide classroom use, and is recognized as one of the foundational works of the Affrilachian Poets, a community of writers offering new ways to think about diversity in the Appalachian region and beyond. DBC17588 | Sir Barton and the Making of the Triple Crown

Born in 1916, at Hamburg Place in Lexington KY, chestnut colt 187-16 had "the look of eagles" that defines great thoroughbreds. Though plagued with a chronic hoof condition, Sir Barton became the first horse to win what later became known as racing's Triple Crown. He was retired to stud after he lost a famous showdown with rival Man o' War, but that was not the end of his story. Covers the racing personalities of the day and the impact Sir Barton had on the sport. Adult. Estimated reading time: 9 hours, 26 minutes.
