



- The potential to reach a larger audience
 - 6-8 people attend our inperson group
 - 33 podcast downloads/month per episode
- A library of content that's always available
 - 59 total downloads/month



Record your audio and upload it to Transistor. We'll help you distribute your podcast to Apple Podcasts, Spotify, and Google Podcasts.






















Staff Time


Record in conference room distanced, raw audio sent to me.

Getting Started!

All you really need is a way to record audio, edit it, and host the podcast.

Simpler is better.

An **iPad/iPod and a mic** is a great place to start.

- Use Voice Memos to record.
- Audacity is a great free editor that works on a PC or Mac.
 - If you have a **PC and a USB microphone**, Audacity can capture your audio.
- Master your audio with **Auphonic.com**. Free for up to two hours' worth of mastering per month.
- You'll need a way to host the podcast and push it to services like Stitcher and Apple Podcasts.
 SoundCloud is a free option.
