



Who Is Classified as a State Employee?


This classification includes persons working in executive, legislative and judicial agencies, commissions, boards, etc.

Employees of public school systems and public higher education institutions can be served by their public and institutional libraries.



This comprehensive database contains full text for top high-school magazines including America's Civil War, American History, Archaeology, Astronomy, Bioscience, Civil War Times, CollegeXpress Magazine, Congressional Digest, Discover, History Today, Nation, National Review, New Republic, New Scientist, Popular Science, Science News, Scientific American,

Smithsonian, World War II, and much more. All full-text articles are assigned a reading level indicator (Lexiles). MAS Ultra School Edition also provides full text for more than 159,000 biographies and primary source documents, hundreds of reference books (including the Columbia Encyclopedia and the CIA World Fact Book), an image collection containing photos, maps, flags and color PDFs and expanded full-text backfiles (back to 1975) for key magazines.

Designed specifically for public libraries, this database provides full text for magazines, reference books and primary source documents. It also includes an extensive image collection containing photos, maps and flags. MasterFILE Premier contains full text for general reference magazines and publications that cover a wide-range of subject areas including business, health.

MEDLINE provides authoritative medical information on medicine, nursing, dentistry, veterinary medicine, the health care system, pre-clinical sciences, and much more. Created by the National Library of Medicine, MEDLINE uses MeSH (Medical Subject Headings) indexing with tree numbers, tree hierarchy and explosion capabilities to search abstracts from over 4,800

current biomedical journals. Included are citations from Index Medicus, International Nursing Index, Index to Dental Literature, HISTLINE, SPACELINE, PREMEDLINE, AIDSLINE, BIOETHICSLINE, and HealthSTAR.

Middle Search Plus



Middle Search Plus

Designed for middle school libraries, this database contains full text for popular middle school magazines, full-text biographies and historical essays. In addition, it includes primary source documents, reference books and a vast image collection. Middle Search Plus contains primary source documents including Essential Documents in American History and reference books such

as the Funk & Wagnalls New World Encyclopedia and the Encyclopedia of Animals. Full-text magazines include Sports Illustrated Kids, Scholastic News, National Geographic and dozens more. All full-text articles are assigned reading level indicators (Lexiles) that provide educators with an estimate of the results reading difficulty and the approximate grade-level reading ability required for comprehension. Lexiles help teachers meet the needs of students with varying reading abilities and interests and allow students to read along at their own pace.

hey should be tweens now, discovering algebra, middle school dances and the truth about Santa Claus. But the 20 first graders of Sandy Hook Elementary School who-along with six of their school's faculty-were lost in a mass shooting on Dec. 14, 2012, will be forever 6- and 7-year-olds, wiggling their first loose baby tooth and tracing smiley faces on frosty car windows. "Not a day goes by, not even a minute, when I don't think about Jesse and miss him," says Scarlett Lewis, of the 6-year-old son she lost that day. "He was the life of the party, bouncing off the walls with energy and fun. The silence when we came back to the house was deafening and sometimes still is."

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Finding some way to move on from unspeakable pain is something 26 families struggle to do every day since a disturbed gunman's 10-minute rampage in Newtown, Conn., forever changed their lives, their town-the world. Marking five years since the

> massacre, People pays tribute to those who died that day and honors the legacies they left behind. For Nicole Hockley, who keeps her 6-year-old son Dylan's ashes in an urn at her bedside-"I'll say 'Hey' and sometimes ask him for a little bit of help if I know it's going to be a hard day"-working to prevent other school shootings is part of keeping her son's memory alive. "I can't stand to have Dylan's life be lost in vain," says Hockley, "and then forgotten."





Daniel was the boy who looked out for everyone—"from his classmates and his family to the worms on the sidewalk," says his dad, Mark. "He can't do that anymore, so I try to do that work for him." Mark cofounded the nonprofit Sandy Hook Promise, which trains students and faculty to respond to early-warning signs of mental illness that can lead to **school shootings**. "I wanted to honor my little Daniel," Mark says.

Dylan Hockley, 6

"There's a theory that if a butterfly flaps his wings on one side of the world, it can cause a hurricane on the other," says his mom, Nicole Hockley. "Dylan is my butterfly. When I visit **schools** and look at the kids, I see butterflies. They're the ones who are going to create the change that will change our country."

Lauren Rousseau, 30

The first-grade teacher is missed by the boyfriend she left behind, Anthony Lusardi III, who is still close with her mom, Terri. "I [recently] surprised Terri for lunch," he says. "She told me, 'Lauren would have loved that.""

Noah Pozner, 6

Arielle, Noah's twin sister, is 11 now, says their father, Lenny, who moved the family to Florida after the **shooting**. "I see my daughters grow, and I wonder what Noah would look like now. He was a perfect little boy."

Avielle Richman, 6

Her parents created the Avielle Foundation to study the science behind violence and compassion. What would Avielle have become if she'd had the chance to grow up? "An artist and a spy. Oh, and a fairy princess, and a writer," reads the website.

Rachel D'Avino, 29

A therapist working with students on the autism spectrum, Rachel now has her name on a scholarship for those continuing her life's passion. "The scholarship means a lot to us," says her sister Hannah. "But it's also heartbreaking."
